Christian Stewardship

Christian Stewardship is

a way of life in which we regard ourselves and our possessions as a trust from God to be used in His service, for what He has done for us in Jesus Christ

This means that
We are stewards of everything God has given us:

our time

our abilities

our possessions

our money

our whole lives





Christian Stewardship is...

- Christianity in practice. It's creative and joyful living as a Child of God.
- The systematic giving of body, mind and spirit to God.
- Being responsible before God for all that I have and all that I am
- The total discipline by which the people of God mobilise their God-given resources to carry out the Great Commission.
- A challenge and a privilege that affects the whole of our lives as Christians.
- The measure of faithfulness in carrying out given responsibilities.
- Waste-watching!
- The practising of the gratitude of attitude to God.
- A way of life – not just a programme.
- Our complete and joyful obedience to God, who entrusts to us the management of life and possessions, that the world might know Jesus Christ as Lord and Saviour.
- What I do after I say 'I believe'.



So...

- God has put enough money in the pockets of Christians to do everything he expects of them.
- It's odd, in a church with people of great faith, to have financial problems.
- Giving is the thermometer of our love.
- Blessed are those who can give without remembering and take without forgetting.
- When giving to God, we are just taking our hands off what belongs to him.
- Stewardship involves the whole Church taking the whole gospel to the whole of the world, and to the whole of every person.
- Christian Stewardship can become a way of life, and lead to a meaningful personal relationship with God and the Holy Spirit.
- Christian Stewardship has got nothing to do with chance. It is about certainty, faith and faithfulness.
- Each new day is a gift from God and also an opportunity for further service in the name of Jesus Christ.
- A Christian Steward fulfils his or her responsibilities as God-given tasks, in a joyful response to Christ as Saviour and Lord.
- Stewardship isn't mainly about meeting budgets. It's more about opening our lives to God's Spirit. That's why stewardship and growth go together.

I shall testify to the high value I place upon Christ and the Church in ministering to the physical and spiritual needs of suffering humanity.

Over the centuries many books have been written to give an explanation for some of the words of Jesus Today many people are still confused about many aspects of Christianity. Therefore the simple Christian Stewardship principles of giving a generous measure of our time, talents and money to God to be used in the name of Jesus Christ for the benefit of humanity, has great appeal to all followers of Jesus.

Christian Stewardship is not about making ends meet, it is about looking to an expanding Church, even in a time of recession and especially in Evangelism. Stewardship is not about giving only what is needed, but it is about giving so generously that it has a touch of recklessness about it. Stewardship is not about one institution giving grudgingly to another, but rejoicing in the mission of others within our one Church. That is the attitude of God's giving to us, and that is the message for our churches.

Truth Using all our resources faithfully is giving to God.

Myth Stewardship is our responsibility to the church.

Truth Stewardship is our responsibility AS the church.

Myth Stewardship is about money.

Truth Stewardship is about life.

Myth Financial stewardship encourages equal gifts.

Truth Financial stewardship encourages equal sacrifice

Myth Give until it hurts!

Truth Give until it feels good!

Myth We give as we are informed.

Truth We give as we believe.

Myth We give as we prosper.

Truth We give as we believe.

Myth We give according to need.

Truth We give as we believe.

Myth We give as we are able.

Truth We give as we believe.



Many of us appear to accept little responsibility for stewardship and for the sharing of the good news of God in Jesus Christ, leaving this to our clergy, readers or PCC. Perhaps even some of these “leaders” need to come to terms with these responsibilities.

Stewards are people who guide and help and make things work e.g. at rugby matches or pop concerts. As members of the church WE ARE STEWARDS of God’s Word. God asks us to help him to guide his people to a Christian faith.

Jesus Christ, Son of God, takes a human place within the world and claims it as his own. He calls us to join him, bringing back this world of things to its proper place under God’s authority. He makes us responsible for it. This is called ‘Stewardship’.

- Rediscover its worship
- Renew its devotional life
- Recognise each member individually
- Respond to the needs of the Church Family
- Relieve long-standing office-holders
- Recruit reliable leadership
- Reaffirm existing commitment

- RELEASE ITS RESOURCES FOR GROWTH
