

Collect

Old Testament Reading

²⁹Moses came down from Mount Sinai. As he came down from the mountain with the two tablets of the covenant in his hand, Moses did not know that the skin of his face shone because he had been talking with God. ³⁰When Aaron and all the Israelites saw Moses, the skin of his face was shining, and they were afraid to come near him. ³¹But Moses called to them; and Aaron and all the leaders of the congregation returned to him, and Moses spoke with them. ³²Afterwards all the Israelites came near, and he gave them in commandment all that the LORD had spoken with him on Mount Sinai. ³³When Moses had finished speaking with them, he put a veil on his face; ³⁴but whenever Moses went in before the LORD to speak with him, he would take the veil off, until he came out; and when he came out, and told the Israelites what he had been commanded, ³⁵the Israelites would see the face of Moses, that the skin of his face was shining; and Moses would put the veil on his face again, until he went in to speak with him.

New Testament Reading

2 Corinthians 3.12-4. 2

¹²Since we have such a hope, we act with great boldness, ¹³not like Moses, who put a veil over his face to keep the people of Israel from gazing at the end of the glory that was being set aside. ¹⁴But their minds were hardened. Indeed, to this very day, when they hear the reading of the old covenant, that same veil is still there, since only in Christ is it set aside. ¹⁵Indeed, to this very day whenever Moses is read, a veil lies over their minds; ¹⁶but when one turns to the Lord, the veil is removed. ¹⁷Now the Lord is the Spirit, and where the Spirit of the Lord is, there is freedom. ¹⁸And all of us, with unveiled faces, seeing the glory of the Lord as though reflected in a mirror, are being transformed into the same image from one degree of glory to another; for this comes from the Lord, the Spirit.

Gospel

Luke 9.28-36

When the Gospel is announced the reader says Hear the gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke.

All Glory to you, O Lord.

²⁸Jesus took with him Peter and John and James, and went up on the mountain to pray. ²⁹And while he was praying, the appearance of his face changed, and his clothes became dazzling white. ³⁰Suddenly they saw two men, Moses and Elijah, talking to him. ³¹They appeared in glory and were speaking of his departure, which he was about to accomplish at Jerusalem. ³²Now Peter and his companions were weighed down with sleep; but since they had stayed awake, they saw his glory and the two men who stood with him. ³³Just as they were leaving him, Peter said to Jesus, 'Master, it is good for us to be here; let us make three dwellings, one for you, one for Moses, and one for Elijah.' Peter did not know what he said. ³⁴While he was saying this, a cloud came and overshadowed them; and they were terrified as they entered the cloud. ³⁵Then from the cloud came a voice that said, 'This is my Son, my Chosen; listen to him!' ³⁶When the voice had spoken, Jesus was found alone. And the disciples kept silent and in those days told no one any of the things they had seen.

Today's Music

The incidental music is mainly French. Before the service are three items from music for the Mass dating from 1682 by Gabriel Nivers -"Prelude", "Recit de Voix humaine" and "Fugue". The rest of today's music is by leading Parisian organists of the mid/late 1800's - "Offertory" by Alexandre Guilmant, followed by five pieces by Léon Boëllmann, "Interlude", "Caprice", "Chant de Matin" and "Prière à Notre Dame". Finally, "Entree" from his 5th Mass setting. At the Peace "While on the sea" a Ukrainian hymn followed by the Prayer for Peace. During communion "Offertory" and "Chant pour Dieu" by Charles Lefebvre. The outgoing voluntary is the "Pontifical March" by Charles Gounod, best known as an opera composer, written for a competition for a Vatican celebration in 1869 and still used at major events there. We do not take a collection during the service at St. Anne's as we have a Parish Giving scheme. - As many of us already do: set a regular prayer/meditation time, every day. And don't be disappointed if you miss one! Just get back to it the following day. There is a Buddhist saying: 'Meditate daily for half an hour, unless you are busy – in which case meditate for an hour.'
- 2) As part of prayer time or on its own, a daily reading from the Bible. As a suggestion since we are looking at the letter to the Galatians during the Lent course, it might be an idea to read a few verses from Galatians each day.
- 3) Giving up something is good, taking up something is better! In fact giving up something is only good when it makes us better people and we share with those who 'have not' what we have given up. A suggestion: Random Acts of Loving Kindness. From dropping in on a neighbour to letting a beleaguered parent with challenging children go in front of you in the supermarket queue. Kindness always makes a difference.
- 4) Where possible come to parish events: The Lent course by Zoom, The Friends hour (see other side of page), and the day of recollection on Saturday 8th March. These are all designed to deepen our spiritual lives and Lent is an ideal opportunity to 'reset' our individual spiritualities.
- 5) Are there people who have been part of your life who caused you great hurt and pain? Hold them in prayer remembering the words on the cross 'Father forgive them for they know not what they do.'

Friends hour

A holy hour has been part of Christian worship since long before the reformation. It is when a community gathers to worship in silence. Quaker (Religious society of Friends) spirituality is grounded in the Meeting for Worship, which usually lasts an hour. There is no liturgy, there is silence which every now and then is broken by someone who feels called to speak. Most meetings are usually silent. There is something quite powerful in people praying/meditating together in silence. We will sit in a circle (people can come and join in whenever they like and leave whenever they like). In the middle will be a table with some books on including the Bible to help our prayer time. The time is spent between each of us and God without interruption. All welcome.
