The Ordination of Revd. Dr. Elizabeth Gloyn

On 14th September, in Chelmsford Cathedral, our daughter was ordained Deacon by the Bishop of Chelmsford. This followed three years of theological training at St Augustine's College in Southwark, an institution especially set up to train those who are called to combine ministry and their normal "day-job". For Elizabeth this is her role as Reader in Latin Language and Literature at Royal Holloway College. She has authored two books and a number of other publications as well as appearing on radio and TV.



She started attending the St Anne's pre-school when she was four and soon joined the Sunday school, followed by her brother George. They then became members of the choir and also acted as Servers until leaving for university. During that time, with help from the Director of Music at Chingford Parish Church, they undertook the Royal School of Church Music Bishop's Chorister Awards – presented to them in Chelmsford Cathedral in 1994.

After attending Longshaw and Latymer schools, Elizabeth went to Cambridge for her undergraduate and Master's degrees and then to Rutgers, the State University of New Jersey, for her PhD. On returning to England, she first had a two-year Teaching Fellowship at Birmingham University before taking up a Lecturer's post at Royal Holloway.



She and Geoff, whom she had met in New York – where he was working for a UK bank – were married by Jude in St. Anne's in 2012. By then they had moved to Loughton, where they still live. Their son Rufus arrived in 2015 by which time they were firmly members of St John the Baptist, just a short walk away from home. Elizabeth had joined the choir there and started to undertake other duties, including being licenced to take home communions. It came as no surprise to her parents when she announced that she was starting the process of being accepted for

ordination – a tortuous process that was made no easier by the intervention of the Covid lock-down and the move of the Diocesan Bishop to become Archbishop of York in 2020.

Despite those interventions and the demands of continuing her jobs as wife, mother and full time academic, Elizabeth successfully completed her training and was formally licenced in June. It was then announced that she was to be a Self-Supporting Curate at St John the Baptist in Epping. She actually started

there before her ordination as Deacon but is now in full swing and enjoying her new part-time role. It was rather a baptism of fire as the parish includes the Bell Hotel, currently being used as accommodation for asylum seekers – a number of whom are active members of the congregation. Some of them have arrived in the UK after several years in Germany, speaking no English, and Elizabeth's knowledge of German has been of considerable benefit.

She was thrilled to see Jenny and Mick in the cathedral for her ordination, an



emotional and joyful occasion, together with all her family and various friends from along her life journey — including one of her bridesmaids who had travelled from Switzerland to be there. She was also grateful for the prayers from St Anne's as she prepared for that momentous step. Hopefully, with the appropriate approvals, she will be ordained Priest next September and we hope that she will soon be able to join us to preach.

Bishop Guli's Visit 26th October

It is not enough to hear the Bible read once a week in Church. We must dig down into and pour over the Scriptures ourselves, with great regularity.
